Stay Cool

Too much heat is not safe for anyone. It is even riskier if you are older or have health problems. It is important to get relief from the heat quickly.

Heat Exhaustion and Heat Stroke

Heat exhaustion is less severe, more common, and occurs when the body becomes severely dehydrated. If left untreated, it leads to heat stroke. Signs of heat exhaustion

- Heavy sweating
- Cold, clammy skin
- Dizziness of fainting
- Weak and rapid pulse
- Muscle cramps
- Fast, shallow breathing
- Nausea, vomiting or both


Heat stoke is the most serious heat-related illness. When the body is unable to control its temperature, it rises rapidly and sweating mechanisms fail. Heat stoke can cause death or permanent disability if emergency treatment is not provided. Signs of heat stroke

- Extremely high body temperature (above 103F)
- Red, hot, dry skin (no sweating)
- Rapid, strong pulse
- Throbbing headache, dizziness, nausea
- Confusion or unconsciousness

These are signs of a life-threatening emergency. Have someone call 911 while you begin cooling the person by getting him to a shady area and cool them rapidly by immersing them in a cool tub of water or shower; spray them with cool water from a garden hose; sponge them with cool water.

If they are conscious and able to swallow, give cool water or nonalcoholic, decaffeinated beverages.

Stay out of the sun during peak times of heat. Always wear lightweight, loose clothing. Stay safe and stay out of the heat.

On Friday, August 9 we will be going to the Mid-America Science Museum in Hot Springs. The museum houses more than 100 hands-on science exhibits divided into individual galleries found throughout the 65,000 sq. ft. of the museum and includes exterior exhibits such as the award sinning Bob Wheeler Science Skywalk, and the all new Oaklawn Foundation Dino



Trek. You will explore key principles of motion with permanent hands-on exhibits like the sand pendulum, vertical wave machine, loopy lasso, do-undo and more in the Marvelous Motion Gallery. Extending 180 feet from the museum, there is a unique award-winning architectural exhibit that offers a stunning perspective of the 21 wooded acres that surround the museum. Enjoy the view and conduct music on the music bench or walk through the fog bridge, all while conquering your fear of heights and learning about science. You are never too old to learn something and this is a great chance to have some fun. The van leaves the center at 8 a.m. and suggested donation of \$17 includes breakfast and admission to the museum.

Subiaco Academy is a private, college preparatory, Roman Catholic boarding and day school. It is an apostolate of "Subiaco Abbey" the religious community of Benedictine monks and is located in Subiaco. On Friday, August 30 we will visit the Abbey for a guided tour. The school came into existence as a result of the German migration to the Arkansas River Valley in the 1870s and especially in the 1880s and 1890s. The Little Rock-Fort Smith Railroad Company had thou-



sands of acres of free land in the area. They had resolved to sell this land only to German Catholic settlers, if possible. This company approached the Swiss Benedictine Monks in Indiana to send missionaries to Logan County Arkansas in 1878. These monks brought with them their Swiss Benedictine heritage of a monastery school. There is a lot of history surrounding the Subiaco Academy and you will enjoy the beautiful monastery. The van will leave at 9 a.m. After touring the Abbey we will head over to Shane's Restaurant for a good home-cooked lunch and the home of the "mile high" meringue pies. Suggested transportation donation is \$7.
